Tay Valley Township modest population growth rate of 3.57% during 2001-2006 period & expected to continue. From 5,440 - 5634 permanent residents.

2009 Executive Summary

Conducted successful and rapid negotiation of OPP contract renewal for period Jan 2009 - Dec 2013:

- Contract costs reflective of continued relatively low crime rate in Tay Valley Township.

- Commitment by Inspector Salisbury during negotiations that reporting on the Tay Valley PSB/OPP Business Plan would be formalized by separate protocol.

- OPP Contract renewal approved by Council Feb 10th, 2009.

**Note The effect of the provisions of the new contract on the 2010 budget are reflected in a reduction of 0.05 in Uniform Full Time equivalents (FTE's) which resulted in reducing the 2.25% salary increases for 2010 dictated by the collective agreement by 1.61% or \$4,300. The reduction in Uniform FTE's also resulted in reducing the Other Direct Operating costs in the 2010 budget by \$900 or 1.47%. These reductions enabled the PSB to limit the increase in the 2010 budget for the Police Services Contract to 2% over the 2009 budget.

Initiated Police Services Board changes:

Appointed Mel Dillon, Provincial Appointee, as PSB Chair effective Jan 2010 to ensure continuity of Board given 2010 municipal elections.
Complied with newly implemented township policy requirements on both Criminal Reference Checks and Accessibility Training – PSB members & secretary

Experienced significant OPP staff changes:

 Inspector Gerry Salisbury seconded on special assignment and Inspector Ray Westgarth assigned as Lanark County Detachment Commander Apr 2009
 Sergeant Robert Croth formerly the Tay Valley Township Community Liaison Officer reassigned to Carleton Place simultaneous with change in detachment command

- Cst. Paige Whiting formerly the Community Services Officer returned to patrol duties

>Experienced a problematic transition period due to above loss of OPP community knowledgeable personnel:

- loss of continuity and understanding of the Tay Valley PSB/OPP Plan

- Statistical reporting accuracy also impacted but ultimately corrected

2009 Executive Summary (cont'd)

> Traffic Initiative Results for Glen Tay Road 40kmph zone reflected average speed 53kmph, similar to prior year results. OPP random speed monitoring to continue.

>OPP speed monitoring and electronic speed sign deployment results for Balderson/Hwy511 showed frequent excessive speeds resulting in weekly OPP RIDE targeting of this area.

>OPP officers conducted a successful search for a missing learning disabled child at McGowan Lake – our thanks to all involved.

>Detachment Commander Westgarth continued to sponsor Lake Network Group/OPP meetings. Officers provided valuable information and understanding to seasonal residents represented by these lake associations in Lanark and Frontenac Counties.

>Received more timely distribution of OPP media releases, and better contract status reporting information based on OPP policy/admin changes.

>Inspector Westgarth provided "Calls for Service" data - a first on this long standing PSB key information request. However, we now need to see this provided on a regular basis. He also provided Detachment audit results, facilitating PSB fulfillment of its obligations under the Police Services Act.

>PSB and Township promoted Crime Stoppers public awareness through purchase and installation of signage on the Otty Lake Side Road and the Harper Road.



OPP Operational Metrics & Comparators – Summary

Review of Selected <u>Criminal Code Offences</u> >5 Year Analysis of Tay Valley data reflects:

> Relatively low crime rates overall

- > Declining trends in several categories but increases in Drug Offences and Mischief
 - Assaults down 17% at 10 incidents
 - Theft down 38% at 23 incidents
 - Break & Enter down 5% at 18 total
 - Drug offences up 117% at 13 total
 - Mischief up 40% at 28 total but well below 2006 high of 53
- > Fairly consistent clearance rates

➢ 5 Year Analysis of Lanark County data reflects:

- Constant or Declining trends in severa categories but similar to Tay Valley, increases in Drug Offences,29%, total 97 and Mischief,21%, total 462
- > Slight general improvement in clearance rates
- Carleton Place & Mississippi Mills typically experience the highest crime rates in the County

Review of 2009 data for Tay Valley vs. other municipalities reveals:

- Crime & clearance rates similar to average of rates for municipalities with comparable populations and households.
- The more urban municipalities experience comparatively higher crime rates but better clearance

Review of <u>Other Key</u> <u>Metrics</u>

<u>Motor Vehicle Collisions</u> > Modest decline, 5%, in Property Damage incidents for Tay Valley & significant decline (61%) in Personal Injury incidents over 5 years > However, 2 fatalities in Tay Valley during 2009 involving alcohol and high speeds. Fatalities in County range from 6 in 2005 to a high of 9 in 2008, and back to 6 in 2009

Provincial Offence Notices (PON's)

 > Slight decrease, 2%, in Tay Valley Township PON's over 2005 despite steadily increasing trend in last 4 years. Tay Valley, at 794, now dropped to 3rd lowest in County
 > County is up 54% overall to 6848 largely driven by Mississippi Mills & Drummond North Elmsley

ESP 2009 Conclusions

 Our rapid & successful negotiation of the OPP Contract renewal was based on 3 factors;
 trust in OPP leadership (D.C.)
 understanding of the OPP analysis process upon which contract costs are based
 rigorous analysis and trending of OPP statistics by our PSB on an annual ongoing basis...this ensured

"no surprises".

➢ It would be prudent for Council to augment its operating budget base in the next two years to offset the impact of any perceived contract renewal cost increases in 2013 attributable to growth in incident volumes if observed in annual statistics and annual reports. While we have not historically experienced significant increases in incidents and staffing (FTE's), during the past ten years, we are not immune from societal trends and associated future OPP cost impacts.

> The two tragic road fatalities, Hwy 7/Glen Tay & the Scotch line involving alcohol and street racing reinforce the importance of traffic law enforcement and OPP RIDE programs. There is no excuse for impaired driving or excessive speed.

Changes in OPP Detachment leadership led to lost focus on Tay Valley PSB/OPP Business Plan implementation. Leadership transitions should be transparentour contract is with the OPP.

The PSB would like to dispel any notion that its satisfaction with the level of service received from the OPP is attributable to the enjoyment of a greater allocation of OPP resources than warranted by the level of activity in the Township or an inordinate involvement by our PSB in the provision of policing service. We are engaged, professional and meet our obligations under the Police Services Act. Over the years we have developed protocols, policies and business plans providing community priorities ahead of sister municipalities. There is nothing unusual that we require of the OPP and our priorities are well within OPP manpower capabilities.

> OPP professionalism and the ability to bring in specialized capabilities was again evidenced in the successful search for a missing child. They are the experts...and we thank them. We have no doubt that the OPP serves us well

> The OPP Drug Squad played a critical role with increasing drug charges being laid in Tay Valley and Lanark County – drugs are frequently the root cause of other crime.

➢ Past efforts by Lanark County PSB's to collectively establish a protocol for the selection of a Detachment Commander were unsuccessful – this needs to be readdressed



2010 Priorities

Major review and update of the Tay Valley PSB Three Year Business Plan including OPP and Board progress against strategies and action plans. Review scheduled to take place mid year upon Inspector Salisbury's return

>Implementation of the PSB/OPP Protocol specific to ongoing Business Plan reporting requirements

Continued focus on drugs and drug related offences using Crime Stoppers and Drug Abuse education programs in schools and vigorous enforcement. Continued partnership between the PSB & the OPP - an effective working relationship must be maintained

Continued emphasis on communications using Township website as repository for key PSB & OPP communications, taxpayer newsletters for key messages and OPP/Lake Associations Networking Group meetings.

> Development & implementation of PSB file structures and retention policies specific to e-mail and other electronic communications
