2011 Executive Summary

- Experienced several OPP staff changes in the senior ranks however these were transparent to the Board Inspector Salisbury is to be commended on his staff leadership. However, an interim reduction in dedicated traffic enforcement officers resulted in fewer Provincial Offence notices (PON's) being issued in Tay Valley and across Lanark County
- Maureen Towaij rejoined the PSB effective April 23rd as Provincial Appointee and was subsequently appointed Chair. Sincere thanks to Mel Dillon, former Provincial Appointee for his many contributions to the Board
- Conducted a major public consultation in conjunction with the OPP, August 2011 in order to validate and update the Tay Valley PSB/OPP Three Year Business Plan. This comprehensive plan covering the period 2011-2013, meets the requirements of the Police Services Act Adequacy Standard. The document has been reviewed by Council and has been posted on the Township website
- Dobtained agreement from the Lanark County Association of Police Services Boards (LCAPSB) that the issues identified by Tay Valley PSB on the deployment of the electronic speed sign were systemic in nature and that a LCAPSB Sub-Committee be formed to resolve the problems and rewrite the LCAPSB Joint Protocol on the Deployment of the Electronic Speed Sign. As a result of these efforts LCAPSB municipalities can be guaranteed their full allocation of days independent of statutory holidays and down time due to repairs. Sincere thanks to John Wilson for chairing the sub-committee and achieving consensus
- Analyzed year over year electronic speed sign deployment data for multiple locations in Tay Valley Township. Results show that regardless of OPP traffic enforcement initiatives, there are three problem areas where aggressive driving patterns are increasing namely Harper Road by the Glen Tay School, Fallbrook at the ball diamond and the 40kmph zone of the Glen Tay Road. The PSB has asked Council to fund and initiate a speed hump trial and Council has initiated a traffic calming measures study.



2011 Executive Summary (cont'd)

- ➤Initiated, funded and obtained approval from Lanark County for the placement of signage on the Scotch line warning drivers of slow moving farm vehicles. The PSB has since recommended, that this trial be extended to the prime farming area of the Christie Lake Road and the Balderson area. Tay Valley Council has supported and funded this request.
- >Inspector Salisbury continued to sponsor and participate in Lake Network Group/OPP meetings. This group is appreciative of his direct involvement. These forums provided valuable information and understanding to seasonal residents represented by these lake associations in Lanark and Frontenac Counties. He reinstated full time marine patrols to address PSB requirements and lake association needs
- >Inspector Salisbury also participated in the Township's ATV Task Force which resulted in Council passing a By-Law June 2011 allowing ATV's on all Tay Valley municipal roads with associated speed restrictions, vehicle requirements and personal safety requirements. He also provided expertise in the revision of the Township's Parking By-law as well as expertise in a major rewrite of the False Alarm By-law
- > Continued to receive very timely distribution of all OPP news releases on specific topics e.g. 'distracted driving' as well as incidents categorized by municipality, and focused comment with excellent summary information titled "On Patrol with the Detachment Commander". Inspector Salisbury also effectively utilized the Lake 88 Radio Station to address a variety of community safety issues.
- >Police Services Contract 2011 Year End Actual Net Policing Costs of \$462,300 represent a 3.9% increase over 2010 Year End Actual Net Policing Costs of \$444,900 and, compared with a budget of \$485,000, produced a 2011 surplus of \$22,700. These results were achieved notwithstanding a 5.075% negotiated increase in salaries and benefits for 2011 and are attributed primarily to a substantial decrease in overtime costs amounting to \$6,700, a reduction in uniform and support salaries and benefits totalling \$4,400 and a significant increase in the Provincial Services Usage Credit in the amount of \$11,600.



OPP Operational Metrics & Comparators - Summary

Review of Selected <u>Criminal</u> <u>Code Offences</u>

≥ 5 Year Analysis of Tay Valley data reflects:

- > Continuance of a relatively low crime rate when assessed on the actual number of incidents with drops in 3 but increases in 2 categories
- Assaults down 14% at 12 incidents compared to 2007 and down 29% from last year at 17 incidents
 - Theft up 7% at 31 incidents
- Break & Enter up 153% at 38 incidents (see Conclusions and 2012 Priorities for detailed comment)
- Drug offences down 60% at 4 total compared to 2007. This is a significant reversal given the prior years steady upward trend
- Mischief down 22% at 18 total compared to 23 in 2007. This is also a significant reversal given a steadily upward trend in recent years
- > Fairly consistent clearance rates the exception of Break & Enters

Review of Selected <u>Criminal</u> <u>Code Offences</u> (cont'd)

- ≥ 5 Year Analysis of Lanark County data reflects:
- > Increasing trends in Assaults 22% at 170 incidents but down from last year at 213, Break & Enter 6% at 165 incidents, but unlike Tay Valley decreases in Theft 11% at 369 incidents and similar to Tay Valley a decrease in Drug offences 3% at 94 incidents and Mischief 11% at 415 incidents.
 - > Fairly consistent clearance rates
- > Carleton Place & Mississippi Mills typically experience the highest crime rates in the County. However relative to Break & Enter in 2011, Tay Valley ranked 2nd highest next to Carleton Place at 42 incidents
- Review of 2011 data for Tay Valley vs. other municipalities reveals:
- > Crime & clearance rates similar to average of rates for municipalities with comparable populations and households.
- > The more urban municipalities experience comparatively higher crime rates but better clearance rates.



OPP Operational Metrics & Comparators - Summary

Review of <u>Other Key</u> <u>Metrics</u>

Motor Vehicle Collisions

- > 30% decline in personal injury over 2007 to 19 in Tay Valley but a substantial increase over 2010 which stood at 8. There was 1 fatality of an elderly Lanark man struck by an impaired driver at Hwy 511/Bathurst concession 7. There was a 4.9% increase in property damage over 2007 but an 11.3% increase over last year
- > Lanark County had a 30%, decline from 2007 in MVC personal injury from 180 to 120 but a 30% increase over last year at 92. There were 5 fatalities in total

> Provincial Offence Notices

- > 12% decline to 745 in Tay Valley Township PON's over 2007 at 843. This is the lowest number in 5 years and reflects the loss of several dedicated traffic enforcement officers due to retirement and transfers, but those officers have since been replaced for 2012
- > Lanark County was up 19% to 6320 over 2007 at 5317. However, when compared to last year all municipalities with the exception of Beckwith were down due to the loss of dedicated OPP resources

Review of Other Key Metrics (cont'd)

False Alarms

- > 25% decrease in False Alarms in Tay Valley over five years to 79 incidents compared with a 35% decrease for the County to 820. The OPP notes that municipalities with False Alarm by-laws in place, see lower rates overall
- > As Alarms require a two officer response, False Alarms represent a significant waste of OPP resources

> Car/Deer Collisions

- > Car/Deer Collisions in Tay Valley totaled 56 and represented a 19% decline since 2007 at 69 but up 19% over last year at 47
- > Lanark County statistics reflect a 1% increase to 380 total
- > Tay Valley had the 2nd lowest number of collisions in 2011 following Montague at 29



Financial Performance

- Police Services Board and Police Services Contract Budget and Actual Costs for the years 2007 to 2011 are described in the following 2 slides (pages 27-28). Summary is below:
 - Police Services Board functions in 2011 resulted in a surplus of \$1,200 comprising under expenditures of \$1,600 in training, seminars & conferences and \$600 in mileage offset by over expenditures of \$600 in honoraria and \$400 in materials.
- Police Services Contract functions identified as "Net Policing Costs" in 2011 produced a surplus of \$22,700 from the following sources:
 - Uniform Salaries and Benefits Costs
 under expenditure \$ 3,400
 Overtime under expenditure \$ 6,700
 - Support Salaries and Benefits Costs under expenditure \$ 1,000
 - Provincial Services Usage Credit substantially greater than anticipated \$11,600





The Police Services Board wishes to draw Council's attention to the comparison of annual inflation rates in Canada during the years 2006 to 2011 compared with the annual increases in the Township's budget and the budget for the policing services contract with the OPP for those years and the total increases for the five years. Policing services contract costs have risen significantly during this period but at only 60% of the Township's net costs. The recent thrust in provincial and municipal government circles to recognize and control police and other emergency services labour costs in the Province is supported in this local example by the comparison of inflation rates with policing services contract costs which are driven in large measure by collective agreement settlements and which almost double the rate of inflation. This said, the above numbers do not take into account the actual annual revenues generated by the OPP (PON's & Service Charges) which flow directly to Township These have totalled \$422,700 for the 2007 general revenues. through 2011 period. Additionally, actual costs of policing have typically come in below budget on an annual basis. While for some municipalities, police contract costs may account for a very high portion of the overall budget, this is not the case in Tay Valley where OPP contract amounts have ranged from 12.8% of the overall Township budget (2007) to 12.1% in 2011



2011 Conclusions

- The PSB/OPP Business Plan public consultation meeting held in August was highly valued by participants, served as an educational experience and yielded significant comment and support to the plan. Tay Valley's work in this regard is held as a model by various other Section 10 PSBs particularly those who wish to develop community based business plans
- While the PSB was pleased with the significant drop in Drug Offences, particularly as this is frequently the root cause of other crime, and was pleased with the drops in Assaults and Mischief, 2011 saw an unprecedented rise in Break and Enters which were largely focused on cottage properties. In response, Inspector Salisbury implemented a new Crime Management Plan and allocated additional resources to tackling the problem. Later in the year, the PSB allocated funding to further assist the OPP with additional technological resources needed to enhance OPP investigative capabilities. While there is no doubt as to the priority and effort given by the OPP, this continues to be an area of high PSB concern and will receive ongoing PSB attention. Tay Valley ranked 2nd to Carleton Place for Break & Enters in 2011 with 38 versus 42 incidents. Mississippi ranked 3rd at 33 incidents

Financial Outlook:

- The Township records actual policing costs on the basis of actual billings from the OPP based on OPP estimates for the year and does not recognize actual policing costs until they are reported. That reporting currently takes place in the fall of the current year and the spring of the following year. In the case of the 2011 fiscal year, out of a total net credit from operations of \$17,900, a credit of \$5,800 was recorded in 2011 and the balance of \$12,100 will be recorded in 2012 and reflected as a surplus for that year.
- In 2011, The Ministry and the OPPA renegotiated a collective agreement covering the years 2011-2014 which provided a salary rate increase of 5.075% for 2011, 0% for 2012 and 2013 and a 2014 rate dependent upon the 2014 First Class Constable rates negotiated in Ontario. The Township absorbed this 5.075% increase, offset by the reduced cost of other collective agreement provisions, in its 2011 budget allocations which resulted in a net increase of 4.64% over 2010.
- The Township may expect a 0% increase in OPP policing costs attributed to salaries in 2012 and 2013. This presents an ideal opportunity to the Township to set aside funds to address additional traffic calming measures advocated by the PSB to curb aggressive driving, such as the installation of speed humps, without impacting its operating budget negatively



2012 Priorities

- Ensure continued PSB effectiveness through the identification and smooth transition of a new community representative.
- Meet Tay Valley PSB/OPP Business Plan three year action plan commitments and reporting of same
- Continue increased focus on addressing the high level of Break and Enter incidents in Tay Valley both through the Property Crime Management Plan and more OPP resources both human and technological
- Continue emphasis on making Tay Valley roads safer with targeted levels of traffic law enforcement & RIDE programs. This includes enforcement of Distracted Driving Offences and Seat Belt enforcement. Return to higher level of PON's is expected
- Support Council in its 2012 traffic calming measures study and support a speed hump trial location in known areas of aggressive driving where electronic speed sign results show worsening trends regardless of OPP enforcement
- Continue focus on drugs and drug related offences using Crime Stoppers and Drug Abuse education programs in schools and vigorous enforcement.
- Work closely with Inspector Salisbury on addressing Property Crime and Violent Crime clearance rates as reported in the Municipal Performance Measures Report 2011

- Foster positive relationships between the OPP and school children via the initiation of an OPP/PSB Glen Tay School Ball Game and Barbecue
- Continue participation by Inspector Salisbury and his officers on the UCDSB Committee addressing youth suicide prevention
- Conduct full time Marine Patrols May 15th September 15th
- Continue commitment to a strong and stable partnership between the PSB & the OPP an effective working relationship must be maintained
- Continue emphasis on communications using Township website as repository for key PSB & OPP communications, taxpayer newsletters for key messages and OPP/Lake Associations Networking Group meetings.
- Complete development & implementation of PSB file structures and retention policies for printed & electronic communications including a documented Records Management Policy
- Complete PSB by-laws, policies & protocols review to ensure compliance with the Police Services Act as well as consistency with Township legal and administrative processes
- Participate in LCAPSB and OAPSB Zone 2 meetings on policing matters of Township, County and provincial significance
